The advertisements on this page, drawn mostly from 1923 issues of Idyllwild Breezes, reflect Claudius Lee Emerson's multifaceted approach. The ad on the right proclaims a range of accommodations, from camping to housekeeping cabin to hotel accommodations to building your own second home.

Cregar Stages' ad outlines the progress of a day's journey from Los Angeles via Pacific Electric train and motor stage.

The ads below for Gus Whisnand's stables and Harriet Snyder's famous Peak and Pine girls' camp, two of many to be found in each issue of Breezes, suggest various ways to occupy the time, once vacationers arrive in the mountains.

Sanatorium, cleverly disguised as "Strawberry Valley Lodge," appears on page 8. (Oddly, his hospital did actually have a hotel wing. Just why it did is lost in obscurity today.)

At the right is a detailed ad from 1911 by Strong & Dickinson, who had bought all of Idyllwild from Lindley and held it until Emerson arrived on the scene in 1917. This pair of developers anticipated the continuing uniqueness of Idyllwild's location, landlocked within national forest.

Finally, as shown below, by 1924 Emerson was concentrating on land sales for summer homes, to fulfill his dream of a settled village in Strawberry Valley.

COMMUNITY FUND GRANT LAUNCHES NEW IAHS PROJECT

We're pleased to report that IAHS has received a \$1,000 grant from our friends at the Idyllwild Community Fund.

Past ICF grants enabled us to acquire our first computer and software for membership and archive records and to upgrade the oral history program with digital equipment. The new \$1,000 grant will launch a pilot project testing the feasibility of making past issues of the Idyllwild Town Crier available on the Web.

This project was suggested to our Board of Directors last year by Halie Johnson at the newspaper and other community members. As IAHS's research program grows more prominent, the limitations of our archive become obvious. With nearly 8,000 items in hand, we're able to respond effectively to only about two-thirds of the inquiries we receive. Because our collection depends on what donors happen to give us, it's necessarily spotty in its coverage.

But there is one systematic source of historical information about the Idyllwild area, at least since World War II, and that is the Town Crier. The Idyllwild Library has a complete set of old editions available, and we often consult it. But finding specific information, especially about people and homes, is extremely time-consuming.

Fortunately, technology offers a solution. It's becoming increasingly common for old newspapers

to appear online at a number of commercial websites. These sites are

especially helpful when they can be searched to locate articles containing topics of interest by specifying keywords, such as names, events, or places. We find, for example, that the Riverside and Hemet papers posted on GenealogyBank.com can aid research on the San Jacinto Mountains. But access to our local

paper would be a vast improvement.

We've determined that the most rapid way to get material scanned and posted on-line is to rely on the mass-production facilities of a commercial enterprise. So the Crier is contracting with Newsbank, Inc., the largest company in the business and GenealogyBank.com's parent, to scan and post five years of early papers, 1949-1953.

Once the papers are posted, we will test the reliability of the scans. We'll also solicit volunteers to suggest or carry out their own searches and evaluate the usefulness of the results.

ONLY IN IDYLLWILD: A TALE OF ENDURING LOVE

Something in our mountain air seems to elicit sympathetic concern, even from visiting strangers. The following letter from the IAHS archive was forwarded to us by the Town Crier:

August 11, 2000

Last week, while family and I were vacationing in Idyllwild, we found the enclosed letter in the dirt beside the road. The letter is so sweet and intense and was kept for so long that it must be important to the owner. The condition indicates that the letter had not been lost long and that its owner had gone to some effort to preserve it.

Can you publish the letter with the intention of returning the original to its owner?

(The text of that half-century old letter recovered from the roadside dirt is reproduced at the right.)

Feb. 21, 1950 2:05 AM Dearest Poo-Poo,

I have come to one conclusion—I LOVE YOU!!! That's final.

You were in a very sweet mood yesterday. I'm glad your [sic] feeling better now. It's so seldom your [sic] sick, I can't understand when you are. I love you in your own sweet, gay self! So don't go getting sick any more.

Less than three months before we are married. Sounds good to me. We've waited so long it seems almost impossible we'll finally see it come true. Time will fly quickly, so our definite date should be set soon. I plan to tell Mr. V— sometime after March 6th. I'll hint for one day off — Sat. Probably won't get it, though. But when we get our vacations, we can really take a vacation, huh?

Books are patiently awaiting my correcting stare, so I'll go to them.

expand the project to cover the Town Crier's entire 66 years. This will require help from our members and friends. We're able to get started quickly, because past donations have given us a complete set of papers for the five years of the pilot project.

But we do need to replace a few issues that have pages missing or articles snipped out. If you happen to have copies from 1949-1953 you could donate

or lend, please contact IAHS as soon as possible at info@idyllwildhistory.org or (951) 659-2717 and tell us which issues you have.

We estimate the cost of the pilot project at \$2,250 for five years during which the paper published only biweekly editions between September and May. The complete project would cost in excess of \$60,000. Clearly, we'd need to attract major funding.

So stay tuned as this exciting partnership project develops.


